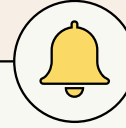

SYMPOSIUM SESSIONS

MORNING SESSIONS 9:15AM - 10:30AM

1A: Don't Let Your Amygdala Drive the Bus

Yesenia Barkley, LMSW

BEGINNER LEVEL

Social Worker, Student Choice High School

This workshop reframes self-care for high-acuity helping professionals by addressing the neurobiological impact of chronic stress. Participants will examine the “cost of caring” and distinguish burnout, compassion fatigue, and vicarious trauma. Through understanding the Amygdala Hijack—when emotional responses override logical processing—attendees will identify personal stress triggers and regulating “glimmers.” The session concludes with the development of a personalized Professional Sustainability Plan, offering practical, protective strategies to strengthen resilience and support long-term professional well-being.

1B: Campus Calm- DBT Informed Interventions for On Campus Providers

Co-founder, The Healing House

Campus Calm is an interactive, evidence-based workshop that equips educators, counselors, administrators, psychologists, social workers, and other student-support professionals with practical skills to recognize, respond to, and de-escalate student mental health crises. Grounded in trauma-informed care and neuroscience, participants learn to identify signs of emotional dysregulation, differentiate behavioral from mental health concerns, and apply effective de-escalation strategies that maintain safety and connection. Through case examples and experiential practice, attendees build confidence in supporting students within their window of tolerance and fostering emotionally safe, resilient school environments.

1C: Generational Healing as Generational Wealth in Latine Communities

INTERMEDIATE LEVEL

Group Practice Owner, Clinical Director, With An Open Heart, LLC

Generational Healing as Generational Wealth in Latine Communities reframes healing as a powerful legacy that extends beyond finances. This culturally responsive workshop explores how intergenerational trauma and resilience appear through emotional suppression, hyper-independence, caretaking roles, stigma, and disconnection from cultural roots. Grounded in trauma-informed, strengths-based, and culturally affirming practice, participants learn holistic approaches that honor mind, body, spirit, community, and identity. Through reflection and an inheritance-mapping activity, attendees gain tools to support culturally meaningful healing and reimagine wellness as a form of collective resilience and generational transformation.

1D&2D: Ethics in School Social Practice - PART I (3 hours - 2 sessions)

PXU Lead Social Worker - Phoenix Union High School District

This ethics training strengthens school social workers’ ability to navigate complex decisions with clarity and integrity. Participants will deepen their understanding of how personal values and professional ethics shape practice in educational settings and learn to apply the NASW Code of Ethics to real-world school scenarios. Through interactive case discussions and guided analysis, attendees will practice ethical reasoning, strengthen confidence in decision-making, and enhance their ability to uphold ethical standards within school systems. 2A: Don't Take the Bait: Self-Regulation Skills for School Social Workers in High-Stress Moments

INTERMEDIATE LEVEL

Social Worker/Clinical Consultant - Bioscience High School (PXU)/ Finding You Wellness, LLC

This interactive workshop helps school social workers stay regulated and grounded while navigating challenging student behaviors and difficult workplace interactions. Using a relatable, engaging approach with a touch of humor, the session blends real-life school examples, reflective discussion, and practical strategies. Through a trauma-informed lens, participants explore stress responses, co-regulation, emotional contagion, and concepts from neuroscience and Polyvagal Theory. Attendees learn concrete regulation skills to use in high-stress moments while maintaining boundaries and professionalism, leaving with tools to respond to difficult situations with greater confidence and resilience.

2B: The Role of Social Workers in School Safety

INTERMEDIATE LEVEL

In today's climate of heightened concern around physical and psychological safety in schools, ongoing training is essential for school-based mental health professionals. This session equips providers to navigate the complex intersections of ethical practice, legal mandates, and trauma-informed care while ensuring no harm is done. As frontline responders supporting students, families, and school communities during crises and unexpected traumatic events, practitioners often face blurred boundaries and rapidly shifting responsibilities. This training offers clarity, guidance, and practical frameworks to help school social workers uphold ethical standards and maintain grounded, legally sound practice in challenging situations. methodologies.

2C: Cause I Ain't Got Pencil-Holding Space for Trauma": Using Creative Expression to Create Spaces of Belonging in Schools

Inspired by Cause I Ain't Got a Pencil, this workshop explores the unseen burdens students carry—trauma, grief, family stress, discrimination, and experiences of not belonging—and how these can be misread as defiance or disengagement. Grounded in Adlerian Play Therapy, the Therapeutic Powers of Play, and belonging-centered practice, participants will learn creative, school-friendly interventions using art, storytelling, metaphor, and play to help students express difficult experiences. Attendees leave with practical tools, ethical guidance, and strategies for fostering connection, emotional wellness, and healing-centered school spaces.

1D&2D: Ethics in School Social Practice - PART II (3 hours - 2 sessions)

PXU Lead Social Worker - Phoenix Union High School District

This ethics training strengthens school social workers' ability to navigate complex decisions with clarity and integrity. 3A: Cositas: Creative Practice for Boundaries, Balance & Bravery

INTERMEDIATE LEVEL

Mary Lou Fulton College for Teaching and Learning Innovation

This session introduces Cositas, an expressive arts intervention designed to support student mental health through creativity, containment, and meaning-making. At its core, a Cosita is a small-world diorama—created inside a container—where selected objects, images, and trinkets begin to “speak” to the maker, representing emotions, memories, and parts of their story. Grounded in trauma-informed and person-centered practices, participants will explore how constructing these symbolic worlds using everyday materials can help students safely express emotions, strengthen internal boundaries, and regain a sense of control. Attendees will create their own Cositas container and leave with a ready-to-implement strategy for school-based practice

3B: Boundaries, Balance, and Bravery: Embodied Resilience for School Social Work Practice

Kathleen Leonard, LCSW / Kathleen McKeever, MA

ALL LEVELS

Full-time Faculty - BSW Program, GCU / Certified Yoga Instructor

Co-led by a certified yoga instructor and a licensed clinical social worker and educator, the session blends trauma informed theory with accessible, yoga-based strategies designed to support both practitioner well-being and student engagement.

Participants will learn how to ethically and inclusively adapt embodied practices for diverse school populations, students with trauma histories, sensory needs, and behavioral challenges. The session also addresses burnout and secondary trauma, offering tools that help school social workers remain grounded, regulated, and resilient while navigating the emotional demands of their roles.

3C: Reclaiming Space for Self-Care in School Social Work

The Body Benefits

This restorative sound bath invites school social workers to reconnect with balance, strengthen boundaries, and cultivate bravery through trauma-informed sound healing. Participants experience guided grounding, therapeutic sound, and reflective prompts designed to support nervous-system regulation, emotional clarity, and sustainable self-care within the demands of school social work practice..

3D: Hone the Nest: Building insight through creative processing

INTERMEDIATE LEVEL

Tempe Union HS District

This will be a fun and interactive workshop where together we will learn about and explore protective factors in the individual, in the family system, and in communities that support us in our healing and allow us to move through challenging experiences in our lives. We will each create a physical representation of a nest by weaving together protective factors, our strengths, our core values, and the goals and intentions we have for ourselves as individuals, and also as practitioners working in community using diverse materials. The theoretical foundation of this workshop is rooted in the research of resilience, neuroplasticity, DBT, mindfulness, ecological systems, and the power of creative processing in building new ways of understanding ourselves and others and creating a life worth living. All of the art supplies will be provided by the presenter.

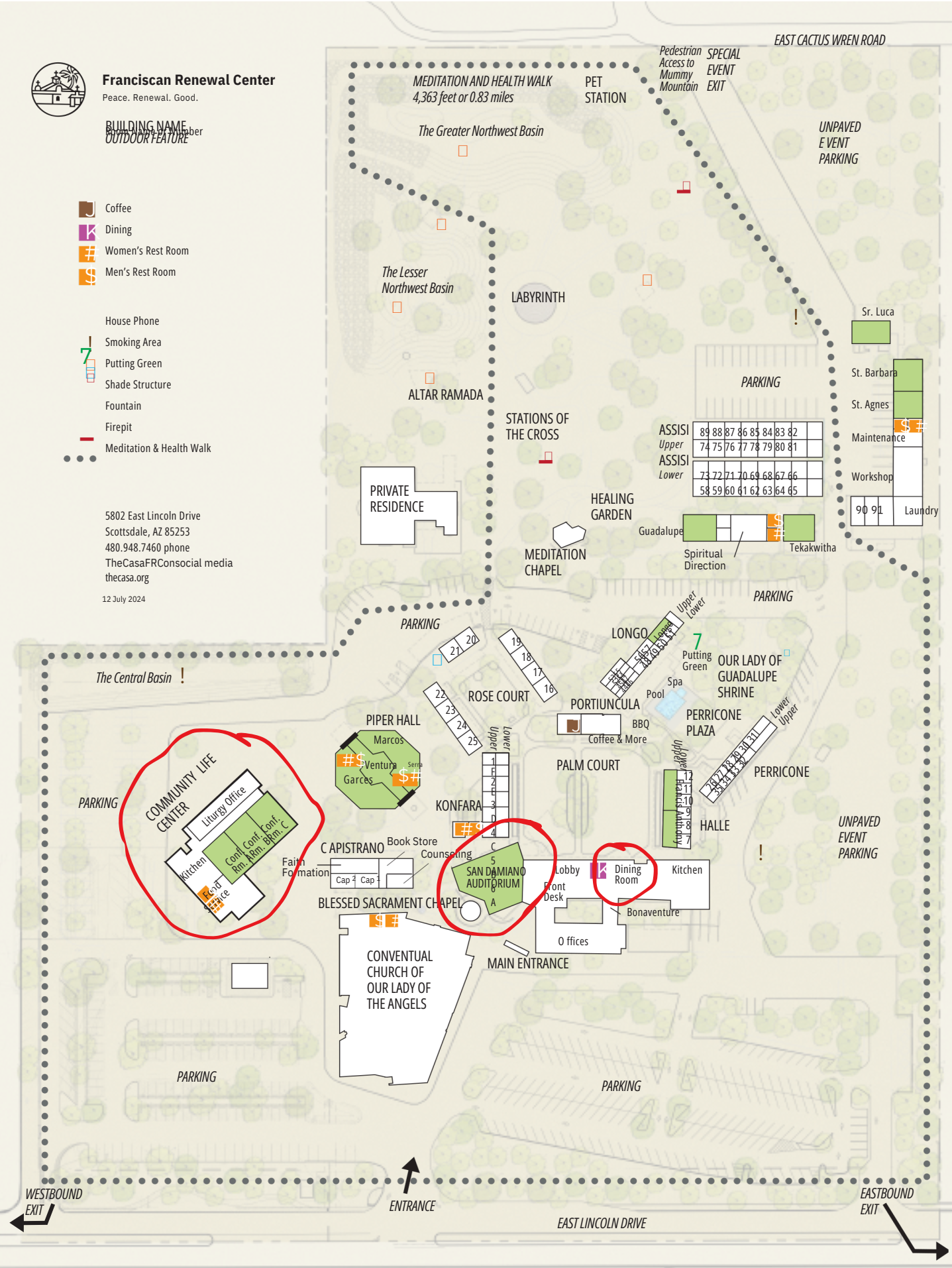

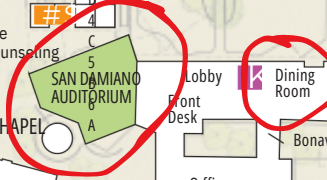
